## **Steel Pan Workshop Days**

We were delighted to be able to give our GCSE music students, and some Year 9 students, the exciting opportunity of participating in a professional Steel Pan workshop this term, provided by Inspire-Works. Calypso Music is part of the Rhythms of the World area of study on the GCSE listening exam and we felt that the best way for students to gain a good understanding of this Caribbean music was to have a go!



Our students enjoyed learning a variety of Calypso and Reggae songs as a Steel Pan band, including Hot, Hot, Hot and a steel pan version of Uptown Funk. Not only did the students get the opportunity to play these incredible instruments but they also learned all about the history and context of steel pan music. It was wonderful to be able to provide a practical music workshop in the Performing Arts Centre again, and we look forward to more in the future.

#### **Music Showcases**

Year 10 and 11 Music GCSE students have enjoyed the opportunity to perform in a recorded showcase in the Performing Arts Centre this term, presenting a wide variety of solo and ensemble performances in styles ranging from Baroque piano to Rock bands. After such a long period of being unable to perform to an audience, it was wonderful for students to share their performances with each other and then with a wider audience via a recorded version of the showcase. A huge part of being a GCSE music student here at Soham Village College is being involved in preparing for, and participating in, a range of performances from small, informal class showcases to large-scale concerts in a venue of 1000 people. For many of our students this was the first performance they had given to a wider audience, and they did not disappoint. We were so impressed with our students' confidence, maturity and resilience in their preparation for the event and indeed in the quality of the final performances. Every tutor group across the school had the opportunity to watch the recorded version of the Year 11 Music Showcase during tutor time in House Week, and this has inspired a number of students to explore the Music GCSE route, or to start learning an instrument.

## **English Department**


We all know how vital reading for pleasure is and the difference that reading regularly at home can make to each and every student. This term, the library and the English faculty have been celebrating World Book Day by hosting a number of events designed to promote reading. To start the celebrations, the library hosted a Harry Potter themed event that included puzzles, 'drawalongs' and 'pin the sock on Dobby' in early February.

Then, in the two weeks surrounding World Book Day after half term, all Year 7 classes visited the library during one of their English lessons to take part in a literary themed 'Who's Coming to Dinner?' and a whole-class story writing activity. All Year 7 students then got to take home a free book to read. The highlight of the celebrations was a visit from Carnegie shortlisted author Julian Sedgwick who came to talk to all Year 8 and Year 9 students about his novel 'Tsunami Girl'. The students were captivated by his story about his travels to Japan and about the events of 2011 that inspired the book. Two Year 7 classes were also lucky enough to work with him in a creative writing workshop that was based on his book 'Ghosts of Shanghai'. They worked on developing a story set in an abandoned place and produced some fantastic work. Julian's popularity was evident from the long queues of students waiting to meet him in the library at lunchtime where he kindly agreed to sign books and answer questions about his writing and career as an author.



## MFL Department

For two Wednesdays in March, a group of Year 9 MFL students went to Weatheralls Primary School to work with Year 5 pupils on a project to celebrate World Book Day. Soham Village College students Willow, Amy, Emily, Sara and Ariyaana, read the French children's book Bon Appetit Monsieur Lapin to Year 5 pupils and encouraged them to join in with some of the key phrases. After the story, they helped the Year 5 pupils to complete a work pack based on the book. The students showed a lot of confidence when delivering the story and all agreed it was a great experience!



**Design & Technology** 

The Community Warriors have been busy making bird houses, hedgehog houses and planters for Fordham Primary School's vegetable garden. In March they took their finished projects over to Fordham and spent the afternoon weeding, putting up new signs and turning over the soil in the raised beds. ## **GCSE PE Climbing Trip**

It was a welcome return to Grafham Water for Soham Village College students after a year's absence to take part in our annual three-day GCSE PE climbing trip.



The trip was a residential, which comprised of two days on Grafham Water climbing wall and a full day at Pinnacle Climbing wall in Bedford. This trip is always a popular event with our students and gives students taking GCSE PE a chance to try an activity they might not usually take part in and at the same time allows the students to gain a mark for one of the three practical activities they need as part of their GCSE PE.



The students worked really learning the various techniques and knots needed to both climb the various walls and also belay each other.

Students were also involved in abseiling and given the opportunity to speed climb using the hydraulic belay and electric timer at Pinnacle climbing centre. Seb Grove was outstanding at this and managed to finish his climb in 15 seconds, a full 6 seconds faster than his nearest opponent.



As always, the behaviour was exemplary and although the climbing was physically draining, everyone thoroughly enjoyed the three days and achieved an early practical mark towards their GCSE PE qualification.



## **PSHE Day**

On Wednesday 9 February the college staged its first full PSHE day in nearly two years! All students were off timetable to take part in a variety of activities throughout the day. Year 7 learnt the value of teamwork with activities run by the PE department in the Ross Pears Sports Centre while Year 8 spent the day looking at the issues surrounding drug and alcohol abuse. This was also the time for Year 9 to participate in their annual World of Work day with specialist sessions ranging from law and forensics to gaming and food preparation. Year 10 continued their work completed in Year 9 on Relationship and Sex Education looking at aspects of sexual bullying and domestic violence while Year 11 had the opportunity to take part in a mock interview with members of the local business community. We were also able to invite in a theatre company to perform 3 shows for different year groups on "County Lines" and Cambridge Regional College sent several members of staff to deliver topics on a variety of courses. All our guests/visitors commented on the excellent students the college has and their willingness to return in the future!











## **BAME Displays**

The artwork made by our fantastic Year 9 students on the Able Gifted and Talented day is starting to be hung up around school. The quality of the work was outstanding and students should be very proud of their hard work. Students will receive certificates soon to celebrate this achievement.






## **Artbytes Exhibition**

## **Student Voice - The Future Group**

The Future Group is a student-run organisation that was started to raise awareness within school and help contribute to the preservation of you or your children's future. Open to all year groups, it is a place where students can make a difference in our community. We have been lucky enough to have a large group of students who want to be part of the team to make change happen.

Our main focus right now has been promoting the planting of trees in gardens and our local community; and encouraging the use of Terracycle, a company that offers free recycling programmes all over the country.

For the last 5 months, we have been working towards starting a recycling campaign at our school which involves having recycling stations at different places at Soham Village College. We did this by producing an informative assembly video, which talks about many of our recent projects, including the recycling campaign. We have promoted this through a 'Go Green' House week at school this term. We introduced our group to the school and as part of this week-long promotion, students across the whole school have now been encouraged to set up recycling stations in their classrooms for everyday items (milk bottle tops, ring pulls, crisp packets, batteries and inkjet cartridges). This will mean that recycling is more available and pollution is minimised.

We have also launched a canary campaign (origami canaries with climate facts to spread around the school) that raises awareness to the crisis we are facing, and have been facing, for the last 42 years. Did you know that in 8 years' time, the effects of climate change will likely be irreversible? This will be when most of Soham Village College are at university, when they have barely started to figure out their future.

There are small, seemingly insignificant things you can do to help. What we want to do is encourage a culture within school where students see the value and benefit of recycling and know that they are doing their bit to help our planet. We want students to think about their actions - The next time they brush their teeth, did they turn the tap off? The next time they leave a room, did they ask themselves, 'did I turn the light off?'? The next time they see a recycling bin, did they use it?

## Student Voice - Superglue 1

Here at Soham Village College we pride ourselves on our tremendous performing arts facilities, this is why when the National Theatre said that "Superglue" (by Tim Crouch) was going to be the next Connections play, we just couldn't wait to dive in and begin adapting the script into our own perspective. Due to Covid impacting the performance rate for the past few years this meant that students were particularly eager to audition for the roles of the many characters Superglue has to offer us.

## What is "Superglue" about?

Superglue is a play written by experimental playwright, Tim Crouch. In this play we follow the misadventures of a group of climate activists who have aathered together for the funeral of their dear friend Mags, who unfortunately died during one of their protests. The idea is that all the characters are in their late sixties yet the actors playing them are all young (meaning they don't get to walk around with a stick or put talcum powder in their hair). This allows the young people to represent what the older people are going through during this time and how they feel as if they still have a lot more to give to stop climate change.

PACT Theatre has been working on Superglue since the 12 October 2021 and many of us would say it has been an uplifting experience for everyone involved. It all began with our Monday rehearsals where we gave feedback to each other and let our imagination let loose as the cast list was put up. After finding out who we got casted as, we then grew the identities of the selected characters to not only be names on a page but to be able to open a window into a realistic view of their lives and how they feel about the whole situation. As we began to act without scripts it was clear everyone grew a bond with their characters and their antics.

From my point of view working backstage it gave me the opportunities I didn't think I was ever able to do and working with such talented people. Even working with people older than me because they gave a view into the play I didn't see myself and how much enthusiasm they had shown into the play.

This play was such an eye opener into climate change and how it's not only affecting Earth but affecting us. I definitely recommend going to see it.
